

The National Immigration Law Center defines an undocumented individual as a foreign national who:

- Entered the U.S. without inspection or with fraudulent documents, or
- Entered with the proper authorization, but then violated the terms of their status and remained unauthorized in the U.S.

IMMIGRATION POLICIES

Understanding current, pending, or failed policies is critical in supporting undocumented students. Be familiar with the following:

Local Policies: House Bill 144, Senate Bill 81, Senate Bill 253

National: DREAM Act, Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA)
Deferred Action for Parents of Americans (DAPA) and Expanded DACA



QUICK FACTS

CAN STUDENTS WHO ARE UNDOC-UMENTED ATTEND COLLEGE?

- In Utah, yes. Other colleges in the US may deny access

WHAT ARE SOME WAYS STU-DENTS WHO ARE UNDOCUMENT-ED CAN PAY FOR THEIR TUITON?

- Eligible students can pay in-state costs under HB144, some colleges do not differentiate between undocumented and documented students, and there are some limited scholarships

CAN UNDOCUMENTED STUDENTS APPLY FOR FAFSA?

- Undocumented students are not eligible to receive Federal Aid

CAN UNDOCUMENTED STUDENTS MAJOR IN CAREERS THAT RE-QUIRE STATE OR NATIONAL CERTI-FICATION?

- Students without DACA are unable to take the final state or national exams, due to a lack of social security number
